The weather stayed dry until part way through the John Holland and Pre-61 racing car race and boy did it rain.

Sandford Andrews made the best of the conditions in Stuart Harper's 1926 Morgan Aero starting from ninth on the grid. With great skill and a fair dollop of courage he worked his way up the field passing round the outside of cars on the sweeping Gerrards bend, to finish an excellent second, beating the Kurtis Indy car and two ERAs; needless to say he was grinning from ear to ear in the paddock as he received the plaudits from fellow competitors.

The Frazer Nash race had a full grid with cars from 1921 to 1937. Justin Maeers had the hood up on his 1921 GN in the paddock and could have done with it during the race as once again it rained. Eddie Williams led until lap eight of the ten lap race when the slow-starting Patrick Blakeney-Edwards worked his way through the field to win in his 1930 Frazer Nash Supersports. Race 8 was the Allcomers handicap with the top four cars finishing within 1 ¼ seconds with James Edwards being victorious in his 1930 Super Aero Morgan, a result to please the hardworking team of handicappers.

A good day's racing; spectators, Marshals and Competitors were delighted.
