


# TABLE-TOP RALLES

#### Table Top Rally edition 16: William Morris' Test Drive

Coloured Roads Only, except where noted.

Starting from Nuffield Place (worth a visit!) at 677876

#### Section 1: To drive you dotty


Using two sections of white, each approx. 300m long. Since it is early, no drinking! (So not passing any PH)

uff **€** 196 198 > ♦ 101
Then pass through exactly 14 ● and 1 ♦

To finish *just before* the church by the Maharajah's Well at 677840½ (and therefore the green dot hiding under the church is NOT included in the 14 above.)

#### Section 2: 'Erring on the side of caution

Not all white roads (dashed lines) are shown, just those to define the route and a couple of others to help:



To just after the Payables Farm Junction at 654824

#### Section 3: Roughly coloured tulips

White roads are only indicated where they are used.

Tulips are in order, but quite roughly drawn!

For the other directions, Imagine you are standing in the middle of a junction. The first letter is the colour of the road you arrived on. Successive letters are the roads clockwise around the junction. Leave on the road that is highlighted!

To end at junction WNW649784

#### Section 5: No NEWS is good NEWS

The VSCC is proud to list a number of legendary vintage motor cars on its register and certainly on that list is R4D. Its consistent performance spanning 80 years since it took the first British Hillclimbing Championship at Prescott this week in 1947, under the stewardship of ERA founder, Raymond Mays, has been outstanding. Today, that legacy continues under the ownership of ex-VSCC Treasurer, Brian Fidler and the driving prowess Committee member, Nick Topliss.

'Me in a Bugatti looking up the exhaust pipes or all those ERA greats and dreaming one day of owning the most iconic one of all. Just took me 50 years to get there....slow plodder but determined.

If you are going to achieve a dream, go for the best.....'

#### Brian Fidler tells us how it feels to own a legend.

Now an octogenarian, I caught Covid 56 when I had just learned to drive. Vintage motoring is not just a hobby, an obsession, it is a full blown incurable illness.....hence the C word. Starting with a 3 litre Bentley whilst still at school, progressing to a GP Bugatti, I appeared in the 1961 Historic car race at Silverstone, alongside a gaggle of ERAs driven by the racing elite of the day, sniffing up the exhaust pipes, trailing far behind. Ah, one day I will own such a dream and ride with the Gods to the Valhalla chequered flag....







And if you are going to achieve a dream, go for the best: the ex works Raymond Mays' R4D, the fastest ultimate iteration of the high riders. Exactly five years ago I had the opportunity of buying that car from Mac Hulbert, who had owned it for nearly two decades. I made him two promises, one that it would not leave the country and the second that it would be used regularly every season. I foresee this being the case over the next many decades through my son, Benjamin, who currently races a red ERA, and eventually my grandson, Joshua.



# ERAR4D



I have only ever driven the car once, very recently at Blyton, it being looked after and raced by our very good friend, Nick Topliss a skilled driver and talented engineer. But for the current virus, it would have been running at Monaco in the Historic where it has won four times previously. Its real talent is as a hill climb car with staggering acceleration (same as a Lister Jaguar to 120) but also timed with a top speed over 160 mph. It is no surprise that Mays held so many FTD in period and post war. Handling has been Tamed by Topliss Talent (TTT) so that its power of over 300 bhp at the rear wheels can be used fully.

Any disappointments? Inevitably, yes. That I am too old and rotund to drive it adequately. That so many of its stellar contemporaries are in other countries, rarely seen, rarely used and seen as investments rather than living history. My pleasure is in seeing a racing car being continously used for what it was intended....to compete in real action, real anger, not demonstrations.


